second year he worked through OTEC. His team picked a neighborhood lot in Binghamton and one in Endicott to plant gardens. He explained, "I liked watching unused areas grow into something because of what we did – and we got to help the community out. I learned that I really like team activities. That's still my preferred way to work – using a team approach and working together to get an end result."

OASIS was a family affair for Bridges – both his brothers were also participants. Bridges' parents appreciated the program and its value, knowing that their children were receiving help with homework, school and career mentoring, and a safe place to be while they were working. Bridges highlighted the fact that OASIS staff and volunteers reached out to his whole family, offering help to everyone as needed.

The program came full circle for Bridges when he returned as a volunteer during his time as a student at SUNY Broome and after: "My role was mostly as a mentor, talking to students who are on the same path I was – making the wrong choices, hanging out with the wrong people. I can encourage them to keep going to OASIS, to build good friendships, and do more than the troubled path they're on will allow. I encourage everyone there to stay with the program and talk to as many of the volunteers as possible. OASIS welcomes everyone without judging and can help you out a lot in life."

From Rev. Janet Couper Watrous' **Keynote Speech**

Watrous carried on a family tradition as speaker – Society founder and her grandmother Esther Couper was the guest speaker at the 50th anniversary gala! For nearly 25 years, Watrous served as a parish priest, a member of the bishop's staff, and a school and college chaplain in Raleigh, NC. In 2011, she returned to Binghamton to serve as the interim rector at Christ Episcopal Church.

Family & Children's began when a small group of people realized there was a problem they wanted to address in their community. It was the late 1930s, and Binghamton was welcoming significant numbers of European immigrants, drawn to the jobs available in local manufacturing.

The Junior League sponsored a home survey project, asking newcomers directly about their most pressing needs. As working parent after working parent explained they had no child care for their pre-school children, the first priority was clear. At this time, Catholic Charities was the only social services provider. My grandmother spoke with their leadership, and was told an additional provider would be welcome. Rooms were rented and Family & Children's began offering services.

My grandmother lived in the 19th, 20th and 21st centuries, going from a pony cart to men on the moon. Her story of helping her community inspires me to live a meaningful life. At the heart of a meaningful life is attention to others, and finding connections with those who seem very different. Having the support of a caring community makes all the difference. In my life as a pastor, people have said to me over and over again, "It makes me feel so good that you just listen." Family & Children's Society is an ear to the community,

telling us where needs are great and acute, and giving us the opportunity for creative, caring responses. We do this by having a staff devoted to our mission, continually refreshing and welcoming new therapies, and bringing relief and comfort. The absolute best thing we can do for this community of ours is to care for its children, its parents, victims of abuse, and those who are alone, mentally ill or suffering with aging or addiction. The best way I know to do that is to support the Family & Children's Society.

Spotlight on Family and Children's Society's OASIS After-School Program

THE OASIS (OPPORTUNITIES AFTER SCHOOL TO IMPLEMENT SUCCESS) AFTER-SCHOOL PROGRAM OFFERS AT-RISK TEENS IN THE UNION-ENDICOTT SCHOOL DISTRICT A SAFE AFTER-SCHOOL ENVIRONMENT ENRICHED WITH WORKSHOPS, TUTORING AND MENTORING. THE SUMMER TEEN EMPLOYMENT CHALLENGE FOCUSES ON WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT SKILLS, COMMUNITY BUILDING, YOUTH VOICE AND CIVIC ENGAGEMENT.

Since 2006, Family & Children's Society's OASIS Program has offered Union-Endicott students age 13 to 18 a safe, engaging and enriching program at no cost to families. OASIS focuses on providing academic support and tutoring, goal setting, career and college exploration, workshops based on youth interest, pregnancy prevention education, physical activities, nutrition education, civic engagement projects and field trips. The program operates out of the Teen Center at the Boys & Girls Club of Western Broome from 3 to 6 PM Monday through Friday during the school year.

OASIS is supported by interns and volunteers from student organizations at SUNY Broome and Binghamton University, as well as community members and OASIS graduates. Said OASIS Founding Director Holly Welfel, "Since 2007, we've been working with faculty, interns and student organizations from SUNY Broome and Binghamton University. It's amazing to see students who seek a rich experience and gain it through their time spent at OASIS. It's common for people to extend their commitment beyond a single semester. Many of the college students form relationships with our teens and seek ways to strengthen the program. Through this work, OASIS youth expand their understanding of higher education and positive decision-making that will affect their future goal-setting. We are extremely grateful for our interns and volunteers – they bring such insight, passionate dedication and fresh excitement to the program."

OASIS also offers a summer employment program called OTEC (OASIS Teen Employment Challenge) in partnership with BOCES Summer Youth Employment Program, the Endicott Police Department and the Village of Endicott. The program operates four days a week for six weeks each summer. Students must apply through BOCES' Summer Youth Employment Program, and the 25 students selected for the available slots work 25 hours per week on a variety of projects in Endicott. The youth-driven projects include community beautification and improvement, staffing the OASIS tent at the National Night Out, assisting with building handicapped ramps through the Ramp It Up program, working in the Central United Methodist Church clothing bank, and assisting with code enforcement.

For the 2016-2017 school year, OASIS is seeking workshop leaders and tutors willing to work with teens. Do you have a skill or passion to share? Prospective workshop leaders meet with Welfel to discuss a potential topic and formulate a plan for a six- to eight-week workshop that meets for an hour each week. Here's one participant's story about how OASIS made a meaningful difference for him and his family.

Dylan Bridges, now 24 and a customer service representative for Time Warner Cable in Binghamton, was in on the ground floor of OASIS, starting with the program the year it began. "Two girls I knew were participating, and they said I should give it a try. The program was just opening up, and I was kind of on the fence about going. I was almost 15, hanging out with the wrong friends and making some bad decisions. Looking back, deciding to participate was good for me – it kept me out of trouble, helped me with schoolwork, and in many ways helped me graduate. The mentoring and adult role models were the most beneficial aspect – that kept me away from the bad side of high school," he said.

Bridges participated in the OASIS after-school program from 2006 through his graduation from Union-Endicott High School in 2009, and the OTEC summer employment program after his sophomore and senior years. The summer after sophomore year was spent working with Cornell Cooperative Extension, planning community beautification projects that he helped execute the
